Chas Dailey as he like to say was “born in Brooklyn buttered in Manhattan.” Charles always wanted to be an artist. As far back as he can remember he was always sketching, painting or just creating. After high school he attended SVA, the School of Visual Arts in New York City. At the time the number Art Institute in the world.

From there he was drafted and spent one year in Vietnam as a combat Medic with the 1st Infantry Division, “The Big Red One.”

After returning from Vietnam, he continued his education at NYU, New York University. During this time, he taught adult Art Classes, did Art Shows, created poster designs and album covers.

After escaping from New York (the cold) he migrated to California. While in Los Angeles, he attended Otis Art Institute. He then formed his own enterprise “Art by Chas” doing art shows all over the country. Chas also became an Artist for the City of Los Angeles before embarking on a career in Education. He created Art programs in the city teaching Painting, Drawing, Sculpting and Art History.

He also became a Dean of Students, College Counselor and taught Black History. He curated shows in all the major museums in the Los Angeles – Pasadena area. He retired several years ago due to health issues. Chas still lives by his motto “When I’m Out of Red, I use blue.”
